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Climate Watch

Australia's National Phenological Network

The IPCC 4th Assessment Report in 2007 noted that of 29,000 data sets on the response of biological systems to climate change, only six were Australian. Of these six none were of national coverage. The problem with this is that in order to understand, predict and mitigate the effects of climate change on biodiversity, the models used are only as good as the data underpinning them. This is particularly pressing in Australia, where the combination of unique flora and fauna occupying a low lying, fragmented landscape is likely to dramatically elevate extinction rates.

ClimateWatch was developed by Earthwatch Australia with the Bureau of Meteorology and University of Melbourne to help understand the effects climate change is having on natural processes in Australia. Essentially, ClimateWatch is based on phenology, the study of periodic plant and animal life cycle events and how these are influenced by seasonal and inter-annual variations in climate.

Indicator species have been targeted by climate change scientists and include eleven plants and six animal species that are found on North Head. There are plans for phenology trails and a data entry station in the visitor centre. Animals to look out for include the Magpie, Willy Wagtail, Cabbage White Butterfly, Honey Bee, Striped Marsh Frog and Pobblebonk frog. All the information to help record what these species are doing is available at climatewatch.org.au – register as a ClimateWatcher and get started.

Plant species will be online in October. With your help North Head will become a permanent ClimateWatch monitoring station.

Mysteries of North Head

The Pistol Range Graeme Sligo an army officer seconded to AIPM alerted me to this structure. Like many of our mysteries, this one appears to have been built on the sly and therefore is not shown on maps, nor are there any official records of it. The range consists of a 3-walled brick shelter shed with seats. On the open side is a cyclone wire fence and, facing this about 20 metres away are a series of wooden and metal frames which must once have held "pop-up people"- silhouettes of people whom the police were supposed to shoot with their pistols.

Third Cemetery



Buried next to **Private Hector** Fraser HICKS is Annie Egan. On 26 November 1918, two nursing sisters, Annie Egan and Minnie Wray were admitted to the hospital at Quarantine Station. They had been nursing the soldiers from HMAT A7 Medic and contracted the disease- influenza

(epidemic pneumonia). By 3 December, Annie Egan was dangerously ill and Minnie Wray was recovering. Sister Annie Egan died later that day. Annie had repeatedly requested a Roman Catholic priest to be at her side. But the Commonwealth authorities refused to allow a Catholic priest to attend her and administer the last rites in the quarantine area. Nurse Annie Egan was a member of the Gunnedah parish. There was a public inoculating depot at Manly at this time, but the Health Department said the inoculation offered a certain amount of immunity but it was not as effective as vaccination against smallpox.

QUARANTINE STATION (QS) CONCERNS

Our Sanctuary Foundation works towards integrated management of the whole of North Head, which is Nationally Heritage Listed. Thus it is of concern that Mawland the commercial lessee of the Quarantine Station proposes considerable new work at QS that that will require changes to their Conditions of Consent. The changes include:

- Adding extra hotel accommodation with ensuite bathrooms in two new buildings, P21 and P23, instead of offering affordable student dormitory style rooms as part of an educational study centre.
- Building new ensuite bathrooms in buildings P1 and P2 that were to be kept specifically as samples of the original heritage character.
- Adding a new reception building at the main entry gate, which may necessitate additional cleared areas for parking.
- Creation of new footpaths in bushland around 3rd class precinct.

Some of the new works will require removal of endangered Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub. The changes will require approval from Dept. of Environment, Climate Change and Water (DECCW) and from NSW Heritage Council. The new NPWS Manager of Visitor Facilities and Services, Penny Spoelder, wants to streamline the process of implementing the changes. The new managers were not around when the public first opposed the development of QS and may not be aware of the extent of public interest in conserving the site as an item of National Heritage.
