James Miller Wilson was another victim of Bubonic Plague. He was brought from Rose Bay on 2 June 1900 to Quarantine Station and died the next day.

From Sydney Morning Herald 3 June 1901 "In Memoriam.

WILSON.-In loving remembrance of our dear son and brother, James Miller Wilson, who died at Quarantine Hospital, June 3rd, 1900, aged 7 years and 3 months,

A precious one from us has gone,
A voice we loved is stilled,
A place is vacant in our house
Which never can be filled.
Inserted by his loving father, mother, and brothers"

#### **Sanctuary Foundation aims:**

'The Sanctuary for biodiversity will honour the natural and cultural significance of North Head. It will be a safe place for flora, fauna and people, a living laboratory promoting the spiritual and biological value of Sydney Harbour.'

It will:

- \* Respect and honour the Indigenous significance of North Head;
- \* Build understanding of the natural and cultural values of North Head; and
- \* Promote integrated planning and management for the whole area, to ensure the highest level of protection for the natural and cultural attributes of North Head.

#### **Back in Time**

From Sydney Morning Herald – 7 August 1933 "WILD FLOWERS. Manly's new garden.

At Manly, on the new reservation, which was recently dedicated and named Park Hill Park, a large area Is being set aside as a national native wild flower garden. Every thing possible is being done to preserve native flora. The Mayor of Manly (Alderman Cross and the council are intent on making the new park worthy of the municipality. Special attention is to be paid to a large area of swampland, In which there are millions of Christmas bell plants. "That piece of coun try," said the Mayor, "is the only one of its kind in the possession of any local government body on the nearer coastline. We intend to preserve every inch of the area.

Footpaths have been constructed to points of interest overlooking the ocean and harbour, and a long footpath running parallel with the main traffic road has also been made. Arrangements are also being made to plant a memory avenue before August ends. More than 200 young pine trees will be placed in position."

### Just over a year later

From The Canberra Times - 28 February 1935 "ALIENATED AREAS Wanted Back For Defence Purposes

Instead of being used for recreation grounds, portions bf the quarantine areas at Portsea (Vic), and North Head (N.S.W.), will be retained by the Commonwealth for the strengthening of coastal defences.

The Government agreed to give a title of permissive occupancy for the area at Portsea on the fulfillment of certain conditions, but the inability of the Flinders Shire Council to meet the expense involved resulted in the matter being left in abeyance, until some arrangement was arrived at between the State and the shire council. Now, however, the Government desires to retain the land as a strengthened unit in Commonwealth defences. At North Head, a permissive occupancy has already been granted and some difficulty may be experienced in obtaining the sanction of New South Wales to its return, but it is thought that the demands of the defence department would take priority over any local government project."
