Spring Wildflower Walks

Judy Lambert The long spell of dry weather we've had at North Head has not been kind to the bush, but despite this the native plants have obliged with plenty of flowers for visitors to enjoy in recent weeks.

Our four guided walks (23 Sept, 2 Oct, 8 Oct and 11 Oct) saw 60 adults and 5 little people participate in walks, each lasting about 2½ hours.

much there was to see and, as always, walks leader Geoff Lambert had plenty of informative tales to tell.

Sydney's Second Airport Planned for North Head?? Geoff Lambert

Well ... not AT North Head actually ... but on an artificial island two kilometres off the entrance to Sydney Harbour. The island would have been triangular, with T-shaped runways. The top would be 50 metres above the water. The rock to build this island would come from the interior of North Head, which would be hollowed out to create an underground passenger terminal. There was also the possibility of having TWO terminals, the other one being under South Head. The island would be connected to these mainland terminals by two 2-km long bridges. From each headland, tunnels would run to Manly and to Bondi Junction.

I suppose you could call this a "pipe-dream", but it was the front-page story in the Manly Daily of 15 September 1981. The airport was the brainchild of a "self-employed building designer from Cammeray", who should, I think, remain nameless. All this hoo-ha occurred during one of periodic rushes of blood to the head about a new airport. Aren't you glad they chose Badgery's Creek instead?

ATUA and influenza November 1918 - part 2

In all there were 88 cases of pneumonic influenza from Atua and 16 died. They are listed below with their name, age and date of death.

MAILILI	23	10.11.1918	south sea islander
LUCID	28	11.11.1918	south sea islander
JASSIA	30	11.11.1918	south sea islander

William Campbell MENZIES 30 11.11.1918. (He was a well-liked purser and had been on Atua for three years. He left behind a wife, Elizabeth and infant child, George. He lived at Artarmon.)



In Memory of my darling & devoted husband. WILLIAM CAMPBELL MENZIES beloved son of CHARLES & JESSIE MENZIES of Dunedin NZ who departed this life 11 Nov 1918 aged 30 years

Percv EATHORN 22 12.11.1918 (Eastmore spelling used in Newspapers)- steward Arthur BARNETT 12.11.1918 23 Steward PERASI (Fijian) 20 13.11.1918 crew Charles LELLAND 34 14.11.1918 (Linnond spelling used in Newspapers) - passenger MONASSA (Fijian) 14.11.1918 (Nornunra spelling used in Newspapers) - native acting as a steward

James MOORE 35 16.11.1918 (interestingly the death notice in the Newspaper has his name as John Albert Moor, same age and job - second cook, and died in Quarantine. Death certificate shows James Moore, but John Moor mentioned in a couple of newspapers as being ill)

John McKARRALL 28 16.11.1918 (McKirrall spelling in Newspapers) - second class passenger

MASSARMURA (Fijian) 29 19.11.1918 engine trimmer

ABEL 30 21.11.1918 native Fijian seaman Charles DICKSON 35 20.11.1918 -steward

A. William BLISS 10 mths 22.11.1918
(A baby boy named Arthur M Bliss, passenger. Mrs Bliss was released from Quarantine on 5 December 1918)
SAVANAKA 24 26.11.1918 native Fijian

"The infection on the Atua was of VERY VIRULENT TYPE. The cases treated at the Quarantine Hospital at North Head, on this trip, were not exceeded in virulence by any subsequent cases treated there. It was on these cases that the Commonwealth coryra vaccine was first tried with successful results"
